

What are the differences between North and South America?

North and South America are two continents located in the Western Hemisphere. However North America is north of the equator and South America, south of it. North America is larger than South America and has a larger population. North America has 23 countries in it whilst South America has 12. The main languages of North America are: English, Spanish and French. In South America they are: Portuguese and Spanish.

THE AMAZON AND SOUTH AMERICA

The Amazon Rainforest is also home to many indigenous (native) tribes who survive on the abundance of natural resources available.

There are two types of rainforests: **Tropical** and **Temperate**. Tropical rainforests are generally warmer than temperate ones. The Amazon is a temperate rainforest.

The Amazon is one of Earth's last refuges for jaguars, harpy eagles, and pink river dolphins, and it is home to sloths, black spider monkeys, and poison dart frogs. It contains one in 10 known species on Earth, 40,000 plant species, 3,000 freshwater fish species, and more than 370 types of reptiles.
