## Blast from the Past! Year Six Homework: Autumn Term

This homework is all related to learning that will take place this term. I would advise you to complete one piece each week and hand in for marking once that piece is completed. You decide which one you choose to complete weekly but please comment on it on the attached sheet.

## In your homework use your best handwriting and spelling.

- 1. Read, read, read, read! Make sure you, or your parents, make a note of your reading in your reading record book. Let me know about the plot of your story or about the characters. If you complete 20 home reads each half term, there will be a little prize!
- 2. Cover and decorate your homework book. Make sure it is your best presentation and reflects who you are.
- 3. Write a biography of Nicholas Winton. Who was he? Why is he important?
- 4. Make your own 3D plane, evacuation case or gas mask! Look online for instructions or ideas.
- 5. Design your own propaganda poster; you can use the computer or draw by hand. I would leave this until after half term when we will have looked at a range of propaganda by then and you will know what to do.
- 6. Record the alphabet in Morse code and then write me a message to decode!



- 7. Design and make a paper aeroplane that can travel at least five metres. We will have a competition in school.
- 8. Write a brief description of one Jewish festival. Try to present this work beautifully.
- 9. **Spelling**. You will bring home a spelling sheet with words taken from the National Curriculum which are appropriate for your age and ability. Please practise these at home and ask your parent or carer to test you. Each time you spell a word correctly, that word is ticked. When you have learnt some words (5-10) bring back your sheet to school and if you have learnt these spellings off by heart you will then move on to the next spellings.
- 10. **Times tables, square numbers, prime numbers.** It is essential that all Year 6 pupils know their **multiplication tables and division facts off by heart**. It is an end of Year 4 expectation in the National Curriculum. Without this knowledge, work on fractions, multiples, factors, divisibility and prime numbers is a mystery! So, practise your tables until you have rapid recall of them all and their division facts. If you are a human calculator and know division facts as well, see if you can learn your square and prime numbers.

Get learning Year 6! Remember, if you can organise yourself and get homework handed in, it will really help you manage high school homework next school year.
